"The Heart's True Treasure": My dear People of God, in today's Gospel passage – Lk 6:39-45 – Jesus offers us wisdom about leadership, integrity, and the power of the heart. He begins with a striking image: "Can a blind man lead a blind man? Will they not both fall into a pit?" This reminds us that as disciples, we must first allow Christ to open our own eyes before we can guide others. If we are spiritually blind—trapped in sin, pride, or ignorance—how can we lead our families, communities, or fellow believers in faith?

Jesus then speaks about removing the "log" from our own eye before pointing out the "speck" in our brother's. This is not a call to ignore sin, but rather an invitation to self-examination. Before we correct others, we must humbly recognize our own faults and seek God's mercy. True Christian leadership flows not from superiority, but from a heart transformed by grace.

Finally, Jesus teaches that "A good tree does not bear rotten fruit... A good person out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good." Here, He challenges us to look at the fruits of our lives. Are our words and actions reflecting God's love? Do we nurture our hearts with prayer, Scripture, and the Eucharist so that we can bear good fruit for others?

This passage calls our parish to be a community of light and integrity. Let us seek Christ's healing for our own hearts, so that we can have clarity and distinctiveness, thus, be true guides to others. May our words and deeds reveal the goodness of God, bearing fruit that lasts. Amen

n eye, and then you will see clearly to take out the speck that is in your brother's eye.

'For no good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit, for each tree is known by its own fruit. For figs are not gathered from thorn bushes, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush. The good person out of the good treasure of his heart produces good, and the evil person out of his evil treasure produces evil, for out of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks
